Council of Commissioners

All powers rest with the Council of Commissioners as laid out in the Education Act. Delegation of authority to the Director General does not divest the council of its right to act on any matter it sees fit.

Director General:

The Council of Commissioners authorizes the Director General to act on its behalf to select, engage, promote, non-re-engage, dismiss and declare in surplus, according to the applicable collective agreement and decrees in force, all personnel not specifically retained by the Council of Commissioners or the Executive Committee in the following delegation: By-Law No. 002/98: Council of Commissioners Regular Meeting, August 18, 1998

The Council of Commissioners authorizes the Director General to act on its behalf to assign and transfer all personnel within their current classification, according to the applicable collective agreement and decrees in force.

The Council of Commissioners authorizes the Director General to act on its behalf to classify and reclassify support personnel, according to the collective agreement.

The Council of Commissioners authorizes the Director General to act on its behalf to suspend and/or dismiss support personnel, according to the collective agreement.

The Council of Commissioners authorizes the Director General to act on its behalf to sign all documents and contracts to implement items within the approved Budget of the School Board providing the said document and contract does not exceed a commitment of \$50,000 and subject to provisos laid out in the job description.

The Council of Commissioners authorizes the Director General to act on its behalf to take immediate action during an emergency situation that may endanger students, personnel, the general public, or the property and status of the organization itself.

The Director General is considered the highest ranking authority for the purposes of the *Act to facilitate the disclosure of wrong doing relating to public bodies* (Statutes of Quebec 2016, Chapter 34).

The Director General shall report on his/her use of delegated authority to the Council of Commissioners on a regular basis.
