School play areas get funding



Last Friday, the Quebec government announced \$266,090 in funding for thirteen schoolyard improvement projects in the Estrie region. The Minister responsible for the Estrie region and for the Family, Luc Fortin, made the announcement on behalf of the Minister of Education, Sports and Leisure, Sebastien Proulx, while he was accompanied by several deputies from the region.

The money comes from the Ministry of Education and Higher Learning, for the 2017-2018 school year, and is for projects that the school boards are undertaking

ACES gets money for playground

in partnership with the community to offer students a favourable, stimulating and safe environment to practice physical activity.

The school boards will receive the following amounts: Hauts-Cantons, \$68,593, 3 projects; Region-de-Sherbrooke, \$97,497, 6 projects; Des Sommets, \$75,000, 3 projects; and Eastern Townships, \$25,000, 1 project.

"I am very happy for the students of the region. They can profit from new and modern equipment, which will make their recreational activities moments of real pleasure and well-being which, in the end, will allow them to concentrate better in class. These investments are more proof that education is a priority for the government," said Orford MNA Pierre Reid.

"Many students will now have access to new installations or to newly renovated installations that are up-to-date. Besides enticing the youth to practice a sport or physical activity more, the improvement to the infrastructures will favour school success, a priority of our government," commented the Minister responsible for the Estrie region and for the Family, Luc Fortin.

The funds going to the Orford riding are: \$25,000 to install game modules and an obstacle course at Ayer's Cliff Elementary School; \$25,000 for a green space gathering area at La Ruche high school; \$25,000 for a 'dek' hockey field and swings at Val-de-Grace school in Eastman.



L'Estrie récolte le plus haut taux de diplomation depuis 12 ans

ÉDUCATION. Le plus récent rapport sur la diplomation par commission scolaire au secondaire indique une progression au Québec et en Estrie.

La Commission scolaire des Sommets contribuent à cette croissance avec une proportion à la hausse de l'obtention d'un diplôme d'études secondaires des moins de 20 ans sur une période de sept ans.

Les résultats sont encourageants, selon la Table estrienne de concertation interordres en éducation (TECIÉ) et le Projet Partenaires pour la réussite éducative en Estrie (Projet PRÉE). Aux dires de ces organisations, pour la cohorte de 2009, le taux de diplomation et de qualification en Estrie est passé de 73% en 2015 à 74,4% en 2016, le plus haut taux jamais atteint depuis 12 ans.

Josiane Bergeron, coordonnatrice du Projet PRÉE, confirme que la proportion provinciale se compare avec celle de l'Estrie. «Nous constatons cependant qu'il reste du chemin à parcourir, mais nous y sommes presque», assure-t-elle.

Selon les deux organisations faisant la promotion de la réussite éducative, la région est sur la bonne voie pour atteindre l'objectif d'un taux de diplomation après sept ans de 77% d'ici 2020. «Le taux actuel étant de 74,4%, cette cible représente une augmentation de 2,6 points de pourcentage. Une cible atteignable», selon Marie-France Bélanger et Christian Provencher, coprésidents de la TCCIÉ et du Projet PRÉE.

Cette proportion est similaire par commission scolaire pour la même période, ce qui se traduit par une augmentation de 8% aux Hauts-Cantons, 6% aux Sommets, 7% à Sherbrooke et 3% à Eastern Township.



Townships schools benefit from beautification grants

Three Memphremagog MRC schools will split a sum of \$75,000 to beautify their school-yards, following the announcement Friday by Luc Fortin, Quebec Family Minister and Minister for the Estrie. A total of \$266,090 has been allocated to complete 13 beautification projects in the Eastern Townships region during the summer of 2018. Of these, \$75,000 will embellish three MRC schools.

Magog's Ecole La Ruche will benefit from a grant of \$25,000 for the development of a meeting area with street furnishings and green space. Eastman's Valde-grâce School received a \$25,000 grant for the construction of a street hockey playing area and the installation of swings and landscaping. Ayer's Cliff Elementary School also received \$25,000 for the installation of game modules and the construction of an obstacle course.

The Magog and Eastman institutions are part of the Des Sommets School Board, while the Ayer's Cliff School is part of the Eastern Township School Board.
