Immediately following the reading of the results, the ballots shall be destroyed.

#### 14. REPORTS

### 14.1 <u>DIRECTOR GENERAL'S REPORT</u>

The Interim Director General, Michel Soucy, reported that all members of the Senior Management are doing a tour of all schools and centres in order to welcome each and every staff member of the School Board. A token of appreciation was given to all the staff members and the Interim Director General also offered the same token to all Commissioners.

#### 14.2 REPORT FROM THE CHAIR

The Chair of the Commissioners' Council, M. Murray, addressed the Council:

The education system enjoys a marvelous characteristic. We get to start fresh every year. Not only teachers, support staff and administrators, but students also get a fresh start in a new class often with a new teacher. This regular renewal permits us to assess our experiences and reflect

on how we would like to do better this time. It is a process of refreshment that allows us to take fresh aim at our goals and refine our approaches. There is always a kind of electric excitement and vitality to the final days of preparation for the arrival of students. Today and tomorrow teams of our board leadership are making visits to all of our schools to welcome back teachers, professionals and support staff. I encourage any commissioners who can do so to participate in the visits. The schedules have been circulated.

Since the beginning of last week, I have been conducting my own version of a welcome back tour, visiting a number of our schools. I took advantage of the reality that despite our calendar indicating that last Friday was the first day for teachers to return, staff members in many schools have been engaged in preparations for much longer. Moreover, as the summer winds down the final touches are being put on the major renovation projects and capital investments improving the learning and working environments. We have many older schools, some of them classically so, and each presents a different challenge as we strive to organize spaces and allocate resources to the greatest advantage of students. Commissioners can contribute by keeping abreast of developments and providing feedback on issues that inevitably arise.

My first visit was to École Sutton School, our special case elementary school that goes one step beyond cohabitation. It is important to acknowledge that it is the only fully integrated school in Quebec with one principal, one secretariat, one staff, and in which all students ride the same busses, share the cafeteria and compete on teams. It offers students a unique opportunity to live and learn completely immersed in the dual cultures of Quebec. We have a new principal, Sarah MacNeil who comes to us from Northern Quebec to take up the challenge of guiding and overseeing the school. I was relieved to see that all but one of the many windows have been replaced because when I visited in mid-summer it appeared as if the school was encased in plywood, not a single opening except the door was visible.

A pet project about which I have spoken previously is to alleviate the crowding at Farnham Elementary. The personnel under the leadership of Jane Akroyd is thrilled and energized.

If you take time to visit schools at this period of the year, you may encounter dismaying indications of projects delayed or incomplete. At Heroes in Cowansville I found a main-floor corridor blocked by construction with wires hanging from an open ceiling like vines in a jungle. The renovation of bathrooms upstairs encountered asbestos - there seems to have been a passion in the past to put asbestos everywhere, even stuffing it into hollows in a building perhaps as a sound baffle - and dealing with it caused delays. However, on the same visit I was able to tour the new playground with an asphalted running track, sliding hill, and other features to encourage students to be active. An ingenious use of a container to store bicycles on hanging racks will allow students to easily and conveniently access a different form of exercise. I am sure the interior mess will be cleared up by Thursday when students return and the playground will be a marvelous improvement.

I should mention the huge contribution of volunteers to the successful completion of many of our projects. At Heroes, Knowlton Academy, and Waterloo Elementary I met numerous volunteers actively engaged in making improvements, whether coordinating the renewal of the playground, completely renewing the kitchen and cafeteria at Knowlton Academy or painting classrooms at Waterloo. We couldn't do nearly as much without their commitment and skills to say nothing of fundraising.

Knowlton Academy is a gem and an outstanding example of how projects can be tied together from the community garden to the renewed cafeteria where produce from the garden provides fresh wholesome nutrition as well as practical learning experiences. The visual improvement at Knowlton, with floor decals, painted stair risers, creative use of colour and attention to detail is a striking example of how an older building can be made visually vibrant and stimulating for students. The floor decals have spread to many of our schools, encouraging students to make a game of moving along a corridor. I just hope that discipline is flexible enough to let kids be kids and encourage a sense of play in our schools. Every kind of movement and activity is proving to be beneficial not only for the body but to stimulate young minds and above all to make school fun and enjoyable.

At Sherbrooke Elementary I joined the principal in imagining a redesign of the cafeteria for greater efficiency as we discussed how to make traffic flow more efficient. The variety of challenges involved in overseeing, managing and leading schools is hard to grasp. Our school leaders deserve enormous respect for all they do, sometimes with limited resources. Money is always a constraint on imagination despite our outpouring of capital projects. Often it is the little things that make the biggest difference, particularly now that we seem to have caught up with necessary maintenance of major items like roofs and windows. There is still much more to do but we are gaining ground every year.

One kind of change for the better seems obvious but has been beyond our means until recently. Security of buildings and the people in them has become a concern and will probably become greater with time. All our school doors are locked but in many of the older buildings the secretary or receptionist cannot see who is buzzing for admission. At Lennoxville Elementary the administrative offices have been moved to give direct view of arrivals, and to ensure they register before being able to access the rest of the school. I was delighted to see the change and almost immediately realized it could be applied in a number of other locations including Sherbrooke Elementary. One of the best examples of access control is at Heroes.

I made a tour of the three Compton schools with the local Commissioner, Mary Ellen Kirby. Cookshire Elementary is in the oldest continuously operated school in Quebec, but despite its age and the associated inconveniences it appears to be an exciting learning environment both inside and outside where extensive connections with nature await students. Ask Mary for details; she is very enthusiastic. It is also exciting to see enrolment growing in Cookshire which, like Farnham, is now flirting with enrolment of 100 students compared to about half that many only a short while ago. The new gymnasium ceiling in Sawyerville Elementary is a wonderful improvement on the old stained acoustic tiles that tended to fall at inopportune moments. However there and elsewhere I found that we could use colour far better than we do. New wooden panels in the gym, for example, could be bright and illuminating instead of a dull brown. I was also a little disappointed to see that the driveway to Pope Memorial in Bury was eroded, which does not reflect the dynamic nature of the school. The staff we met in Pope didn't mention the driveway but are enthusiastically getting ready for the reentry that will see enrolment up.

I want to congratulate our buildings and grounds team under the leadership of Éric Plante. Despite my occasional concerns, they have once again performed outstanding work bringing projects to completion in time for the reentry. They face huge challenges getting so much major work done in the brief summer break and we all owe them our admiration for the results. We talk about education as if it takes place entirely through teaching in classrooms without thinking about how the buildings and grounds make environments that enhance learning. From little cushioned cupboards in the back of classrooms where students can withdraw to de-stress, to the shelving that allows books to be easily accessed, often it is the detail that makes the difference. In that context I want to add congratulations to our custodians. Every school I visited shone with cleanliness and was inviting for students. Many were still busy adding the finishing touches to their summer's work, and proudly explained their role in making schools inviting. It was a pleasure to meet them and acknowledge that it takes a whole community of varied talents and contributions to make public education succeed.

# 14.3.2.4 Resolution No. E19-08-09 <u>CLSC Lennoxville – Lease Agreement Renewal</u>

**WHEREAS** the Centre Intégré Universitaire de Santé et de Services Sociaux de l'Estrie – Centre hospitalier universitaire de Sherbrooke (CIUSSS de l'Estrie - CHUS) had a lease agreement with the Eastern Townships School Board (ETSB) since August 1, 1995 for the CLSC - Lennoxville;

WHEREAS the lease agreement expired on July 31, 2005;

**WHEREAS** a five-year renewal lease issued on May 9, 2011 ended on May 8, 2016 and has been renewed on an annual basis since May 9, 2016;

**WHEREAS** the ETSB and the *CIUSSS de l'Estrie – CHUS* have negotiated a new five-year lease agreement starting May 9, 2019 and ending on June 30, 2024;

WHEREAS this new lease agreement contains an annual renewal clause after June 30, 2024;

**WHEREAS** the negotiated lease agreement is deemed acceptable in terms of pricing for the Eastern Townships School Board and the other conditions are also acceptable;

**WHEREAS** the amount of the lease for the first year is \$61,836.32 for a total of \$333,303.80 for the five-year lease, with indexation clauses;

**IT WAS MOVED BY** Commissioner G. Barnett to authorize the signature of the lease agreement between the ETSB and the *CIUSSS de l'Estrie - CHUS* regarding the CLSC - Lennoxville. **IT WAS FURTHER MOVED** that the Director General be authorized to sign all associated documentation and that in his absence, the Director of Material Resources may also sign.
