

The Tillotson Coaticook Region Fund Supports ETSB Schools & Centres

The Tilloston Foundation was created when Mr. Neil Tillotson, who was a resident of New Hampshire but was born in Hereford Hill Quebec, passed away at the age of 102.

Upon his death, the bulk of his wealth was donated to the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation. In 2012, the Tillotson Coaticook Regional Fund was awarded \$3,000,000 US and has been donating the interest from the fund back to the community ever since.

This year, the Tillotson Coaticook Regional Fund gave back \$124,600 to local organizations and schools in need.

COVID-19 - Staying vigilant is paying off in Estrie

All schools and centres of the Eastern Townships School Board, with the exception of Drummondville Elementary, are under the territory of the *Centre intégré universitaire de santé et de services sociaux de l'Estrie* (CIUSSSE), which is referred to as the Estrie Region.

Currently the Estrie region is still classified as an orange zone. Although the recent statistics for our region are encouraging we want to take this opportunity to remind everyone to be vigilant and continue to follow the directives from the government so that together we can break the COVID wave.

In recent days, we have seen some cases across the Eastern Townships School Board's network. With the collaboration of the *Direction de la Santé Publique* (DSPu), these cases have been dealt with in a timely manner to ensure the safety and well being of our students and staff. To help us with this process, it is important that the school be made aware as soon as possible of any student who receives a positive result. By doing so, the investigation can begin sooner to ensure that those individuals at risk are identified and informed promptly.

LVTC received \$3000.00 for its Student Help Fund, which offers support to students in need so that they can continue their studies.

Sunnyside Elementary School

Sunnyside received \$1500.00 for their visual arts program. Sunnyside teacher Tammy Mosher describes the project:

"The purpose of the grant application is to provide all the students at Sunnvside the opportunity to learn various art techniques and produce projects. The funds will be used to purchase the art materials needed for the Visual Arts class. Projects will include the use of various mediums such as watercolour paints, gouache, charcoal, oil pastels, chalk modge podge, canvases, clay, pastels, construction paper, watercolour paper, hot glue sticks, popsicle sticks, etc. Visual arts are extremely important at Sunnyside and it provides the students with a different media to express themselves. Included in the grant application is a request to have money for a local artist to come into the class in grade 5-6 in December to walk them through a step-bystep painting that the students can then give as a present. At the end of the school year, 1 am in hopes to plan an art exhibit at Sunnyside to showcase the students' pieces of art so the community can see their many talents."

Report Cards and Term Dates

This year the reporting schedule for student progress has been revised to include only two rather than three terms. Therefore, the first term will now end on December 22^{nd} , with the first report card being available on the <u>MOZAïK Portal</u> on January 22, 2021.

In the interim, the first communication concerning how students at school are progressing is already or will soon be available on the <u>MOZAïK Portal</u>. Information concerning November parent teacher interviews will be sent to parents directly by their child's school.

The second term will now end on June 23, 2021 with the final report card being made available before July 10th, 2021.

In alignment with the new reporting schedule, parents will receive new Standards and Procedures for the evaluation of learning from their child's school.

Accident Insurance

The school board holds liability insurance covering its actions and those of its employees. However, the ETSB does not hold accident insurance for students.

In order to cover any injury or material loss suffered at the school during an outing or activity, the school board strongly recommends that parents have insurance coverage.

Broken glasses, teeth, a damaged school bag or clothing that is torn at the entrance or outside of classes, bus stop (drop-off zone) or at school during recreational or sports activities or during recess or school trips are not covered by the ETSB insurance. <u>The ETSB does not hold accident</u> insurance for students.

In this regard, parents and adult students are encouraged to check with their insurer about their coverage in the event of damage resulting from accidents for which the ETSB is not responsible.
