4. <u>QUESTION PERIOD</u>

The Secretary General, E. Campbell read the Question Period norms.

J. Beauregard, WES student:	Our Grade 6 class decided to go on strike. We have been bullied, yelled at and humiliated by our teacher. What do the Grade 6 students have to do to be heard by the Board and have our complaints taken seriously?
M. Murray:	You must make your complaints clear to your Principal, then the Principal sends said complaint to the Council of Commissioners and the Secretary General. General complaints are difficult to manage. Be specific.
M. Seline:	Is the Council aware of a public health survey on mental health for the youth aged 12-25 years old in the Estrie region?
M. Murray:	Yes, the Council is aware of the fragile state of mental health of students due to COVID. The Parent's Committee Administrators are aware of this survey. Results will be generated and the Director of Complementary Services, E. Gaudet will share them with the Council.
M. Seline:	Does the Council know that the results are specific to the Estrie region?
M. Murray:	I repeat; it has been presented by E. Gaudet to the Administrators and to the Parents' Committee. The Council has not yet seen the presentation.
Tara Coulombe:	My son is part of the WES group and he has a question.
E. Read-Consela:	Our teacher yelled at me and when she realized it, she turned around and asked if I would now run home and tell my mom. Do you encourage students to keep their struggles to themselves? What will happen to the teacher? I feel bullied and unsafe!

Commissioner T. Pezzi-Bilodeau:The anticipation and excitement was on high as students, staff and community members of Drummondville proudly unveiled their NEW school. The process to arrive at this moment was long and winding, but thanks to the committed efforts of many, the goal was finally realized on March 8th 2022 when Drummondville Elementary School (DES) officially opened its doors.

The ETSB community observes Black History Month

Commissioner R. Gagnon:Black History Month was recognized throughout the ETSB during the Month of February. Many interesting and poignant opportunities were created for students and staff to explore our shared history and carry the learning forward. Below, you will find a few highlights from our schools.



Asbestos-Danville-Shipton Elementary School (ADS) – Commissioner T. Pezzi-Bilodeau:

During the month of February, Ms. Viens' grade 6 students at ADS Elementary School learned about Black History Month. They researched famous Canadians who marked Black History, such as Viola Desmond and Carrie Best & learned about the Underground Railroad and the fascinating journey of Harriet Tubman. Ms. Palik, principal of ADS, visited the class to share her experience living and teaching in West Africa. She also shared pictures, artifacts and the historical background of slavery and slave castles. Students were especially attentive when Ms. Palik shared stories from her personal experience of being married to an African man and how it created a beautiful blend of both cultures in her life.



Knowlton Academy (KA) – Soul Foods Commissioner R. Gagnon

The students of Knowlton Academy studied how various foods that are very common in today's North American diet actually originated from Africa and were brought here as seeds and roots with the slaves. Students talked about black-eyed peas & licorice, watermelons, sweet potatoes and what a "mess of greens" was. Students looked at how over the years, all of these foods developed into what is today considered soul food and a part of the traditional African American diet. Together with KA gardener Jen Muir, the students' explorations were full of colour and significance.




Sutton School Commissioner R. Gagnon

7. <u>NEW BUSINESS</u>

7.1 Resolution No. ETSB 22-03-53 School Bus Bids – 2021-2022

WHEREAS the Eastern Townships School Board owns and operates a fleet of school buses;

WHEREAS to maintain a dependable fleet and keep repair costs down, it is necessary to replace buses on a regular basis;

WHEREAS the *Ministère de l'Éducation du Québec (MEQ)* has established parameters for the exchange of buses and has monies set aside for this purpose;

WHEREAS on December 20, 2021, the *MEQ* authorized the Eastern Townships School Board to proceed with a call of tenders for the purchase of new vehicles in accordance with the terms of the management measure "School bus";

WHEREAS the Eastern Townships School Board requested bids for the purchase of school buses for the 2021-2022 school year;

WHEREAS one (1) bid was received from one (1) supplier and opened on February 24, 2022;

WHEREAS the bid conformed to the requirements set out in the call for tenders;

WHEREAS the amount of the lowest bid from *La Compagnie Lion Electrique* was \$3,427,711.37, including taxes and trade in;

WHEREAS the amount does not include the \$1,350,000.00 from the *MTQ* financial aid program for the electrification of school transportation by the province of Quebec;

WHEREAS the *MEQ* must conduct an analysis of the bids received and will confirm their authorization of the allocated amount based on the methods of management of the additional and specific allowances and other activities for 2021-2022;

IT WAS MOVED BY Commissioner <u>G. Holliday</u> that the Eastern Townships School Board accepts the bid received from *La Compagnie Lion Electrique* for nine (9) 72-passenger school buses conditional to the authorization from the *MEQ*; **IT WAS FURTHER MOVED** that the Director General or the Director of Transportation be authorized to sign all associated documentation.

The Director General, M. Soucy, reported on the new Drummondville Elementary School:

9.2.1 Resolution No. ESTB 22-03-54 Ukrainian Refugees

WHEREAS the Government of Québec has announced that Québec will welcome Ukrainian Refugees "with open arms";

WHEREAS a number of school service centres have already announced that they are willing to receive refugees from Ukraine;

WHEREAS some Ukrainian refugees may have some knowledge of English as a second language;

WHEREAS English language school boards in Québec are equipped to take in students and teach both French and English;

WHEREAS the Charter of the French language has a humanitarian clause allowing for the admission to the English school system under exceptional circumstances;

WHEREAS the Ukrainian refugee crisis is a humanitarian issue;

WHEREAS Québec's English school boards are willing and able to help in assisting in the education of Ukrainian refugees in Québec;

IT WAS MOVED BY Commissioner <u>R. Gagnon</u> hereby to indicate to the competent governmental authorities that it is willing to welcome Ukrainian refugees into our schools on humanitarian grounds effective immediately.

Commissioner G. Barnett:	Lennoxville Elementary School (LES):	
	Mr. Barnett attended a LES Governing Board (GB) meeting. The following was discussed:	
	Mural Project – The School is coordinating relations between the Mur à Mur and the School Board regarding the Mural project and any changes needed to the north wall. So far, the School has raised \$8,000 - \$9,000.	
	Breakfast program – The School is trying to get the program up and running again after being closed by COVID, probably with baskets going to classrooms since they cannot get back to the cafeteria because of schedule changes.	
	COVID – Students and not staff received a box of rapid tests after Christmas. There are no school vaccination clinics planned, but students can go to a local clinic to receive a vaccination. Also, students are still receiving masks.	
	 Bubbles – Students no longer have to be in class bubbles and they do not have to wear masks when seated, but they do have to wear them elsewhere. In this regard, students are much happier. 	
	✓ Santé Globale (SG) School – The School will become a SG school, which requires 150 minutes of physical activity a week plus one hike per year, one overnight camp, 18h per year on health and well-being and one school project per year in order to bring the community together. The School has 7 outdoor activities and uses several local sites. The students are using nature to learn. This reduces their anxiety and stress and they are much more willing to speak French. It was a challenge to have 150 m/w in physical activity and was achieved by increasing physical education and French to 420 minutes per week; the outside activities being in French. SG has a lot of available pedagogical material.	
	 Winter Fun Day – The students really appreciated this and one was heard to say that school is starting to look like normal. 	
	✓ Registration is currently at 310 students.	
	✓ Google Classroom – Parents found online learning to be a challenge with several children online, more time being required for younger students. Google Classroom was found to be useful to explain autonomous work to parents and students.
